

Proposed Amendment to Grace Church By-Laws

As currently stated in our Parish By-Laws, Article II, section 1, “The presence in person of 50 qualified electors of the Parish, as determined by Canons, shall constitute a quorum at any Parish meeting.”

The proposed amendment would say “To constitute a quorum at any Parish meeting, the presence in person of qualified electors of this Parish, as determined by the Canons, shall be at least 20% of our Average Sunday Attendance, as reported in the most current filed parochial report.”

Holy Land Pilgrimage

A journey to the Holy Land was never on my bucket list. In the fall of 2017 I was actually starting to plan a trip to Norway when Fr. Todd casually mentioned that he wanted to plan a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. A few weeks later he announced that Grace Church would journey to Jerusalem during Advent 2018. Chris and I looked at each other and decided to put Norway on hold. When would we ever be able to travel with friends AND a knowledgeable priest to the Middle East? We have now returned from our pilgrimage, and it was one of the most spectacular trips Chris and I have taken. It is difficult to choose favorite sites of the pilgrimage because everything was fascinating.



A particularly moving site was the Church of St. Peter at Galllicantu, or “church where the cock crowed.” Built on an almost sheer hillside, the Church of St. Peter of Gallicantu stands on the eastern slope of Mount Zion. On its roof rises a golden rooster atop a black cross — recalling Christ’s prophecy that Peter would deny him three times “before the cock crows.” Peter’s denial of Christ is recorded in all four Gospels (most succinctly in Matthew 26:69-75). The scene of Peter’s disgrace was the courtyard of the high priest Caiaphas.

The lower levels of the church contain what are believed to have been a guardroom and a prisoner’s cell, both hewn out of bedrock. It is thought to be the cell where Jesus was detained for the night following his arrest. The guardroom contained wall fixtures to

attach prisoners’ chains. Holes in the stone pillars were used to fasten a prisoner’s hands and feet when he was flogged. The prisoner’s cell offered sobering insight into where Christ probably spent the night before he was crucified. It has become known as “Christ’s Prison.”

The only access to the bottle-necked cell was through a shaft from above, so the prisoner would have been lowered and raised by means of a rope harness.

We entered the Sacred Pit in silence. The Pit is about fifteen feet square, twenty feet deep. No door, no window, no light. We read from Psalm 88: “My soul is full of trouble and my life draws near the grave.... You have put me in the lowest pit, in the darkest depths.... I am confined and cannot escape.... You have taken my companions and loved ones from me; the darkness is my closest friend.” (vv: 2, 6, 7, 18)

The remains of Caiaphas’s house and courtyard are directly next to the church. Excavations have uncovered a stepped street which in ancient times descended from Mount Zion to the Kidron Valley. These stone steps were certainly in use at the time of Christ. On the evening of his arrest, Christ probably descended them with his disciples on their way from the Last Supper to Gethsemane, and then again when moving from Pilate to Caiaphas once arrested.

We walked the very steps Christ walked when moving from Pilate to Caiaphas, before being imprisoned in the pit the night before he was crucified. Heady stuff. I loved this site and the physical layout that so clearly demonstrated what happened the night before Christ died.

We encountered many sites that left all of us feeling awestruck and emotional. Ask us about them! And, if you ever have the opportunity to visit the Holy Land, GO! Make it happen. Then you, too, can bask in the Jerusalem Effect.

Many years ago, long before I had undertaken any seminary classes, I had some amazing clergy teachers. Not only was I blessed to have them as instructors, I had so many profound “aha” moments that I came to believe, and still do, that adult education is a power that can transform the church for good. That’s why I am so passionate about it. But the reason I enjoy teaching

Every time someone comes up to me or emails me how much they appreciate what we have discussed or studied, it proves to me how important it is to learn all that we can about our faith, our faith journey, and how God is ‘with us.’ We laugh together, we get serious together, we discuss together, and we all learn from each other.

So I am more than thankful for the opportunity of being with the people from Grace who make the time and the effort to be part of this wonderful group.

In addition, the Mission Trip helps teach 15-18 year olds teamwork and how to respect and live among one another, and gives them the opportunity to grow their social skills and manage their time to meet the daily schedules and work assignments.

And yes, let's not forget these young adults learn how to build houses from the ground up, pour concrete, paint, and organize working spaces and grounds. In most cases they are learning these skills for the first time.

Missioners quickly sense the importance of their work and are eager to complete tasks because they know others less fortunate than them will benefit. They make a point of meeting with the families they are helping. They 'feel' the gratitude extended to them. That's a beautiful thing to see.

Missioners participate because they want to help others and they treasure the joy they receive when doing so. What a great life lesson. During the year leading up to



the trip, missioners give their time, talent and treasure to help fund the trip. Much of the money raised is then offered to local Habitat for Humanity and our host church in the area.

The youth sacrifice a week of their summers. In June 2018, in Iowa City, Iowa, each of the six days was consumed with giving

back. They represented themselves and Grace Church admirably, while also learning how to become responsible stewards of the church.

This is a Grace Church event and has been for 23 years. Our kids aren't part of a bigger group of missioners... they are Grace Church missioners, continuing the legacy and tradition, one year at a time. They grow from the experience, they are mature and responsible, and they also have a lot of fun.

Grace's new labyrinth has been used several times for an activity (Acts 7:33), "Then said the Lord to him, Put off thy shoes from thy feet: for the place where thou standest is holy ground."

Our hope and goal for 2019 is to invite new members to join us. Women of all ages are welcome. This is a warm, friendly group open to possibilities. It is especially great for working women to have a night out once a month, enjoy a meal, talk, laugh, cry, and share the Blood and Bread of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Women of Grace

WOG Mission Statement:

To connect all women of our parish to the whole Church through a program of worship, study, service, outreach and fellowship. Women of Grace (WOG) is the official Episcopal Church Women's (ECW) group at Grace Episcopal Church. All women of the Episcopal Church USA are automatically members of the ECW.

The Women of Grace program year runs from September through May, with meetings on the third Tuesday of the month. Most months we enjoy a brown bag lunch and our speaker follows with a presentation. We explore the many aspects of our faith, as well as form new friendships and strengthen the bond of long-standing fellowship we share.

In addition to our monthly speaker meetings, our special events also provide meaningful opportunities for fellowship as we work together to provide financial support and resources for our church family, members of our community, and St. Stephen's of the Diocese of Puerto Rico for hurricane relief.

Our annual Mother's Day Drive for Kirk Care brought in a wealth of food, supplies and gift cards to help feed our hungry neighbors.

On December 8, WOG held its 13th annual Holiday Sale. Net profit was **\$4,471**. Proceeds will be used for outreach and a capital purchase for Grace Church.

In 2018 WOG donated **\$1,500** to Grace for the purchase of new vestments. **\$1,500** was donated to people of the Diocese of Puerto Rico for hurricane relief. Additional donations totaling **\$850** were made to Diocese of Missouri ECW (\$200), SPROG (\$600 for one week of lunches), and Church Women United (\$50).

I have often described my role in Women of Grace as a "labor of love." However to be completely honest, that love will sometimes be seasoned with frustration and a dash of healthy debate. There is something mystical about the blending of personalities into community, that helps us discover so much about ourselves and others. Through working together, learning together (at our speaker meetings), sharing the experiences that the business of community entails, and caring for each other, we ultimately find spiritual growth. I believe God is found most often in the voices and faces around us.

Women of Grace has been a holy community for me. I continue to be inspired by the women and men I have come to know through my work at Women of Grace.

Women's Book Group

The **Women's Book Group** falls under The Second Mark of Mission: *Teach, Baptize & Nurture*. During the winter of 2018, our congenial group finished reading **Barefoot** (novel three of the *Sensible Shoes* trilogy) observing how four women friends faced the challenges of their lives in their new calendar year. Then a **Bel Canto** performance went seriously awry in South America when terrorists crashed an operatic concert in the Vice-President's home, leading to months of tense negotiations and the surprising personal growth of the mired guests and rebels.

Come spring, we saw the **Underground Railroad** in a unique way via a highly lauded award-winning novel. Then the non-fiction book **Killers of the Flower Moon** showed us how Hoover's young FBI team unraveled the murderous 1920 attacks on the affluent Osage tribe.

Summer selections included two very different nonfiction books. **Writer, Sailor, Soldier, Spy** enlightened us to the writing and secret adventures of Ernest Hemingway from 1935 to 1961, as indicated by the title. **If You Lived Here I'd Know Your Name** gave us amusing and poignant insights about the residents and life in a small Alaskan town.

Changing pace with English humor, the group finished the summer and entered Fall with a popular quirky fiction book, soon to be a motion picture; **Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine** helped us appreciate

life-changing friendships found unexpectedly. After resolving Eleanor's problems, we tackled life from an American male's perspective with David Sedaris' memoir **Naked**, entering his hilarious, strange, elegiac and sometimes outrageous world. We closed out the year by starting to read and discuss **The Accidental President**, closely following Harry S. Community of Hope

“I felt a spiritual awakening on my second practice visit. I visited a young woman who was in the process of dying. After visiting and praying with her, I left feeling joyful, rather than depressed.” This is how many Community of Hope lay pastoral care givers feel when sharing the presence of Christ with others.

It is just the opposite of how one would expect to feel in these circumstances! When we fully immerse ourselves in focusing on the spiritual needs of the one we visit, we see Christ in them and we become Jesus' hands and feet in the world. What would seem difficult for most people, through prayer and community support, shaped by Benedictine spirituality, through extensive training, becomes a work of joy. Yes, sometimes we cry, but most often we leave a care receiver feeling blessed we could share their experience with the gift of our presence.

Not only are we fulfilling our Baptismal Covenant, we are doing the work Jesus asked us to do in Matthew 25:35-41. We are feeding the hungry, giving water to the thirsty, clothing the naked, visiting those who are sick, lonely or in prison. We are the hands and feet of Christ!

2018 had us growing our community by eleven additional members by leading a class this Fall. We had members of our own parish, students of various parishes within the Diocese and also extended outside our denomination.

“Having a community to worship and debrief with is reassuring to the work we do. This is the most sacred of all the work I do.”

“The requirement of daily prayer has deepened my faith and forged a stronger relationship with God and opens my heart to even more possibilities to serve and see the Christ in others.”

We are creative in the ministries we serve in. We visit those in prison, feed the hungry, sit with those who are sick or dying, walk with service men and women who are deploying, visit aging veterans or those who suffer from PTSD. We tutor children from inner cities or refugees applying for citizenship. Where there is a need – we are there.



Outreach Ministries

Grace Church Outreach seeks to facilitate through all parishioners our Lord's caring and sharing ministries to the greater community, and to fulfill our baptismal vow to seek and serve Christ in all persons. Our programs fall under the 3rd and 4th Marks of Mission. Through Grace's Outreach Ministries, in 2018 our parishioners gave assistance to people in need — providing time, talent, funds, goods and outreach monetary grants as shown below and on the following pages:

- AFEDJ / Princess Basma Children's Center** (Fr Todd McDowell) **\$4,000 / 1 hr**
Parishioner Easter donations plus an outreach grant provided the above funds for the *American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem* to support this medical center and specified resources.
- Food Pantries: Deaconess Anne House Little Free Pantry** **\$ 200 / 1 hr**
Kirk Care (Dick Entenmann, Mike Fitzgerald, Sue Nixon) **~ \$4,643 / 500 hrs**
Trinity CWE (Becky Coulter & the Nicosias) **~ \$3,417 / 160 hrs**
The Outreach Committee authorized a total of \$200 to provide food items for the DAH roadside Little Free Pantry. Grace parishioners generously filled the Hunger Barrel 16 times (@\$150 ea= value \$2,400), supported food drives and gave monetary donations... 7 Grace volunteers helped Kirk Care stock Food Pantry shelves, shop and deliver food to neighbors in need. The WOG Mother's Day collection provided \$1,230 cash/cards & 43 bags of groceries to Kirk Care (est. total value \$430). Becky works 3 hours most weeks at Trinity and parishioners provided hats, gloves and travel toiletries to those utilizing the pantry. Both major food pantries were given an additional \$2,000 in grants during 2018 by the Grace Outreach Committee.
- Grace Hill** (Sue Nixon) **~ \$ 500 / 50 hrs**
Outreach provided a \$500 financial grant to support 2018 Grace Hill programs.
- Hands on Kirkwood-11/ Celebration Event** (Vince & Michele Nicosia) **\$ 250 / 300 hrs**
68 Grace parishioners worked during HOK-11; more donated winter clothes, books & kiddie items for free HOK distribution to the community, and baby blankets/diapers to *Nurses for Newborns*. After community work was completed on Oct. 6, our parishioners hospitably provided a welcoming venue for 200+ volunteers to lunch and share work stories over chili, mac 'n cheese, hot dogs, snacks, sodas, hot drinks and homemade desserts to reward their efforts. This record-breaking year for HOK involved over 700 total volunteers working 40 community projects, distributing 8,500 winter clothing items, hundreds of toys and 160 food boxes to Kirk Care and 33 infant care items to *Nurses for Newborns*.
- Historically Black Colleges & Universities** (Fr Todd McDowell) **\$ 250 / 1 hr**
The Outreach Committee supplemented the parishioner collection to donate \$250 to HBCU.
- Magdalene House Giving Tree** (Vince & Michele Nicosia) **\$ 245 / 10 hrs**
Parishioners generously donated \$245 in gift cards to Magdalene House through the Giving Tree, allowing MH residents to select personal items and special foods, making their new year bright & happy.
- Meacham Park Adopt-a-Family Event** (Sue Nixon, Paula Russell and the Nicosias) **\$ 700 / 100 hrs**
Middle-and High-schoolers made and sold Turkey Cookies to raise \$200 in funds for toys & games, making a total of 40 gifts (~\$250) to make Christmas brighter for Meacham Park children. Grace parishioners and the Outreach Committee contributed \$450 in gift cards for families. Sue Nixon & Jennifer Sisul attended the well-organized Dec 15 MP Holiday Party.
- Shepherd's Center** (Dick Entenmann & Mike Heyer) **\$ 500 / 125 hrs**
Shepherd's Center enables older adults to remain vital and independent through programs and services that promote positive aging. Grace's 5 volunteers and a \$500 grant helped the center provide programs to the Kirkwood senior community, including: *Handy Hands, Shepherd's Travelers, Adventures in Learning, Chores Galore, Transportation Ministry* and the *Resource Center*.
- Trinity Hot Lunch, CWE** (Chris Kurth) **\$2,649 / 200 hrs**
Before retiring in Dec, Chris 'shook up' the menu, changing from Grace's usual pork loin dinner to summertime brats & beans, and then to much-enjoyed meatballs & potatoes. This year ~100 volunteers bought, prepared and served 12 delicious meals for 863 CWE people. In Feb. and Dec., Grace Sunday school students made cards and assembled goodie bags for distribution to THL guests.
- United Thank Offering** (Shirley Browne) **\$ 648.61 / 15 hr**
Grace parishioners provided UTO nearly \$649 in *Thank Offerings* to support mission and ministry throughout the Episcopal Church and provinces of the Anglican Communion in the developing world.

Outreach: Shepherd's Center

The Shepherd's Center of Webster-Kirkwood is the best-kept secret of local nonprofits. I became aware of it while working at the Kirk Care Food pantry in 2012 through Denise Miller. She recommended that I investigate it as an organization that does great things. I took her "gentle nudge" and put my name in as a volunteer. I have never regretted that decision. I have been a member of their Board for six years and have recently re-joined it.

The Mission of the Shepherd's Center is "Inspiring Older Adults through Enrichment, Volunteerism, and Community Connection." We provide programs and services to folks in our area and have volunteer opportunities in living out our mission. In addition, Grace is a sponsoring congregation and provides resources to the Shepherd's Center to help with their mission.

The one service that my wife Becky and I are part of is the Transportation Ministry. We provide rides for folks within our service area to their doctor's appointments, wait there and take them back to their residence. Our time commitment is minimal, about 2-5 hours per month. Since we can schedule our rides ourselves, this does not interfere with our other activities. We access their online requests, pick our ride for the following week and contact the rider. It seems like a very simple, minimally invasive thing, but the folks we serve are very appreciative of what we can do for them.

Personally, the folks I have met during my drives have been very interesting. One was the mother of the Bishop in Kansas City, another has been a professional bowler, another had been a school teacher for more than 50 years. One particularly interesting ride takes me to the pool/workout facility at Jefferson Barracks. He is taking physical therapy on a weekly basis, so I take him and wait for an hour until he finishes. I get a chance to speak with many veterans as they use the facility. Everyone I have driven has had their own special story, but the one thing in common is their appreciation for what we do. It gives me a great feeling to be able to give back to folks.

Outreach: Trinity Hot Lunch

Count on a miracle.

Yes, if one's Christian discipleship or food ministry is dedicated to the glory of God, one can expect a miracle.

Once during my eight-year tenure as cook and server for the Trinity Hot Lunch program, food was running out. A miracle was needed. And miracles happen. History and the Bible record them. After the 1906 San Francisco earthquake, a fire threatened the city's Mission District. But one hydrant kept pumping water even though the area's water was cut off... a miracle honored every April 18 when the hydrant gets a new coat of paint. And Jesus' miraculous feeding of the five thousand is recorded in all four gospels.



But one time at Trinity Episcopal Church when the brats and baked beans were running out and the line for "seconds" had already formed, a miracle was needed. Unspoken prayers and spirit-guided Grace Church servers helped everyone who wanted seconds get something to eat. 108 brats fed 65 people twice! "God knows how to count," said Grace server Don Woehle, who witnessed it. So always expect the outreach program's Trinity Hot Lunch to give you a miracle.

A successful Summer Celebration Event was held again at Grace on June 22 and *A Moment in Time* was supported by Grace parishioners on Oct 11. 50 Giving Tree Christmas gifts (valued ~\$385) plus \$430 in gift cards were donated for ECM youth needs.

Outreach: St Louis Family Court Youth Mentoring

I have served as a mentor to youth connected to the St Louis Family Court since moving to Kirkwood. I believe I am a deputy youth officer for the family court, but I have no badge. The youth I have mentored have been 15-years-old.

The basic purpose of the mentoring program is to provide a positive role model for the youth. I have found this to be a ministry of being present to the youth. I spend time listening to my assigned youth and answering his questions. I have been surprised by the questions I have been asked but I have to remember I may be the only adult male they have talked with at this level. That I am a Vietnam War veteran normally comes out and I get questions concerning my service, such as how many people did I kill? How I answer their questions depends on the youth and why I perceive they are asking their questions. Some youth trust me more than others.

The youth mentoring program needs young men and women to volunteer as mentors. In the past there has been a shortage of women mentors. I am viewed as a grandfather figure to the youth and I am not expected to run up and down a basketball court with them. Although I was trained to be a mentor, my primary role is to be there for them or to be myself. My youth coordinator interviewed me to learn more about who I am and my interests so I could be matched to a compatible youth.

Junior Warden

Report submitted by Rebecca Harrison

2018 was an eye-opening year as Junior Warden. Although I have been here since 1959, and therefore here when this church was built, I had no idea of the state it was in.

We started in January of 2018 with a major plumbing issue in the kitchen that required major expense to repair. It was the first of many.

The lower level classrooms below the church itself are an on-going repair. The side used by the Lab School is the more heavily used and therefore takes almost weekly fixing of some kind. The bathrooms in that part of the building are equally old, and equally needful of maintenance. 60-year-old plumbing requires parts that are getting increasingly difficult, and therefore expensive, to find. Ultimately, it would be in our best interest to replace those old fixtures, however that is not in our budget.

The choir room is, of course, the same age. It, too, has a bathroom that could use an upgrade, and it is in the choir room that we recently found a new problem: wiring. All they did was turn on a light switch, and wires actually melted in the walls. We managed to fix the immediate problem, but again, that wiring is 60 years old and should be replaced, however like the plumbing, it is not in our budget.

The outside of our property has long needed its own upgrade, and fortunately, we managed to get an increase in the 2018 grounds budget to cover the start of a push to make our grounds beautiful once again. This was only a start, but we will be doing another phase when spring arrives. We will be doing the other



side of the front and the area around our “new” spire.

The spire itself will finally be finished once spring arrives. As part of that project, we will get the driveway and monument lights that have been off since the tree fall two years ago repaired, as well as installing the new spotlights for the spire itself. It will be impressive once complete.

Our current project is waiting for the weather to break. The roof of Albright Hall, which has been roofed more than five times (so we have six layers up there) is finally worn out. It is 38 years old. Frederic Roofing will be tearing it all off back to the original base and putting the new one on as soon as the weather clears. Once they get the new roof on, there will be major exterior finishing work to the Parish Hall. It, too, is showing its age.

Last, you will see the return of Walter Knoll as they refresh all of our flower beds and re-mulch them to keep them looking as beautiful as last year. If you were



not aware, we have had people that are not members here comment on the beautiful grounds. We even had a group use our grounds for a photography competition. Our goal is to keep them looking great, but still have enough in our budget to deal with other issues on the grounds, like the trees that

need trimming. It is a balancing act with our very limited budget.

It has been an honor to be your Junior Warden for 2018. It gave me a chance to serve our Lord, and our community of faith, in a way I never would have contemplated. It is a very rewarding position, and one I will happily do again, if given the chance.

It has been a blessed and busy year. Here are some highlights.

In January we dedicated the newly labyrinth in Albright Hall. It has brightened up our parish hall and thrills the children who like to follow the path whenever they are there. Grown-ups, too, find walking the labyrinth slows down their stresses and revives their spirits. The project was made possible by a generous grant from the Diocese of Missouri's New Ventures in Community Ministry fund and our St. Matthew's Bennett Avenue fund. A labyrinth had long been a vision for the St. Matthew's congregation, and now, here it is. It is a symbol of pilgrimage for our whole congregation, the Diocese, and our community.



Just when we thought we had resolved the flat-roof problems with a new roof funded by a White Loan from the Diocese of Missouri, we found out that the saw-tooth roof over Albright Hall is badly aged and needs to be replaced very soon to protect the interior from damage. So, back to the drawing board we went, looking to expand the White Loan and meet another crisis. Our very alert and practical Junior Warden, Rebecca Harrison, has been attentive to present and future needs that our large grounds and 60-year-old church building present.



The merger with St. Matthew's congregation in 2013 has brought many blessings. This year, we used reserved funds to erect the St. Matthew's Church spire which had been salvaged from the demolition of the church building on Bennett Avenue in Warson Woods. It now stands near the intersection of Argonne and Woodlawn as a tribute to the generations of people who were members of St. Matthew's parish and symbolizes the legacy of the union of our two parishes. Some work is left to be done when weather permits, including spotlighting this beautiful addition to our grounds.

Among many important decisions and practical business matters the Vestry attended to this year, the most important is the decision to go forward with a capital campaign we are calling *Our Journey Continues*. This is a momentous decision, because all other regular ministries of the parish must continue while we are assuring the health of Grace far into the future. The majority of the

funds we raise will assure good care of our facilities into the future. It also will light up our lives with much needed upgrades to lighting in the nave, increase the legacy outreach fund, and pay off the White Loan (remember the roofs!) debt.

I am grateful for Grace's Invite, Welcome, and Connect initiative which is helping all of us to better know one another and new individuals and families who attend and choose to join our parish. I'm looking forward to the Invite, Welcome, and Connect program to be held at Grace, March 1 – 3 in conjunction with the Annual

Diocesan Leadership Conference. I hope that many of our Grace members will attend.

Rector's Report

Epiphany III 2019 – I Corinthians 12:12-31a

The Epistle for today is about the church being the body of Christ. Why do you think the apostle Paul used the image of a body to symbolize the church? Our bodies are strange, and wonderful, and complex, and awesome, and awkward things. Our bodies are capable of amazing physical feats -- just think back to the Olympic Games. Those athletes gave the world a picture of the body at its healthiest and strongest. But our bodies are also capable of being weak and sluggish. The characteristics of a healthy body in Christ are unity, equality, and empathy.



So, the body of Christ is gathered here this day, many different parts but one body. And today, as the body of Christ, we embark on a new capital campaign entitled *Our Journey Continues...*. In some ways it is unlike previous capital campaigns which have had a tangible brick and mortar focus. Our last campaign of nine years ago in 2010, which replaced our major HVAC systems, gave us new thermal glass windows, and retired our debt. The campaign ten years before that one at the turn of the millennium in 2000 which built an addition to our facilities, with a beautiful conference room, offices, ADA compliant restrooms on both floors, handicap accessible exterior doors, and an elevator. We are the benefactors of the many generations that have called Grace Church home over the past 160 years.

Yes, 2019 is the year that we celebrate 160 years as a parish in the Diocese of Missouri. 165 years ago, the year after Kirkwood was founded, Episcopalians gathered at the Bodley's new home each week to read Morning Prayer. Within five years they had bought land and built a beautiful English gothic church at the corner of Taylor and Argonne (now Eliot Chapel). But they wouldn't issue a call for Grace's first rector until the debt from that building was paid off in 1865. Our parish later purchased land and built a parish house at Taylor and Washington in 1924. The parish bought a large city block where we sit today and built a new church for worship in 1960 and added the parish hall and Sunday school classrooms in 1964. Our merger with St. Matthew's in 2013 brought additional land to our parish which was sold and that money in our Legacy Fund provides us with more than \$40,000 a year.

I was recently asked: Why do we need a capital campaign to endow our buildings? They went on to say that each generation has always paid for our facilities themselves. But that is not completely accurate; we have always benefitted from our previous generations which bought the land and built the buildings which we enjoy today. Through those saints of old, we have a beautiful building which sits on an entire city block and has all been paid for by them. In this 21st century church world we are not being called to buy more land or build new buildings; additional square footage is not needed to live out our dreams for God's mission and ministry in this community. But as our building approaches 60 years of age, we are being called to remember what we have, to maintain it, to honor the past, and modernize into the future.

Through our pledges and financial gifts, we are projected to pay about 73% of this year's budget for our current needs. And let me express my kudos to you for that, because that represents more than a 5% increase in dollars over last year. Thank you for your strong support of our annual stewardship. 20% of our budgeted needs will be covered by earnings from our traditional endowment started in 1983, and our legacy fund started in 2013. Those are funded primarily with estate gifts given out of love for this Grace parish which has meant so much to so many for 160 years. Five percent of our budget will come from the use by others of our building, one percent from other income and less than one percent from fundraising.

You ask: Well then, our budget is too big and why don't we cut it back? We have been doing that each and every

year in order to pass a balanced budget. This year your vestry gave up their annual retreat, the personnel committee had asked for merit salary increases for staff which had to be eliminated, a new folding machine was removed from the budget, and staff and ministries went back through their budget requests and cut significantly in order to cut expenses. These were sacrifices made by many in order to keep our mission and ministry alive and vibrant. I am proud to say this represents the seventh year in a row that we have given our full tithe to the Diocese of Missouri and our seventh year presenting you with a balanced budget. We have been able to do all of this while maintaining God's mission and living out our ministries which help define who and whose we are.

So yes, we have our beautiful church and building and block which is a beacon of hope to those in our community. I know of no other church which has its doors of welcome so wide open as we bring in more than 300 non-parishioners each week to use our facilities to further God's work: St. Thomas' Church for the Deaf, the Lab School, SPROG, Contemplative Outreach, many 12-step programs, and others in our community. Our building is truly an important ministry not only for our own needs but for the more than 300 people each week that find God's presence here at Grace Church. So, we have a church with a building and grounds which is vital to our ministry, which most of us have not had to pay for but was entrusted to our care as a gift from previous generations to continue God's mission and grace in our community.

The long-term viability of this parish will be maintained through endowing the cost of maintaining our building and grounds. A successful \$1 million campaign would add enough annual income to our legacy fund to provide for the annual budgeted expenses of our building and grounds. Imagine if future generations didn't have the annual expenses of these facilities to worry about, and all the funds raised in our annual stewardship went to the current ministry needs of this parish without worry for the building.

I'm sure you have seen the numerous churches with for-sale signs, many throughout St. Louis and all around the country. There is only one reason that these churches had to close: they couldn't maintain their buildings. The size of any parish can ebb and flow over time, ministries can grow or shrink accordingly. The one fixed cost that we can't escape from is that of the buildings and their maintenance.

Other parts of this campaign will improve the inadequate lighting here in the nave, reduce our debt from new roofs and boilers, and a 10% tithe will go to the Legacy Outreach Fund to provide for others in our community. In fact, if *Our Journey Continues* campaign is successful in reaching our goal, the people and agencies supported by our outreach will benefit from an additional \$5,000 each and every year.

We are so fortunate to have our wonderful and dedicated staff; they are always going above and beyond for the people of Grace. It is through our staff, lay leadership and all of you the people of Grace, that we are able to carry on God's mission and vibrant ministry in our community. I am also very grateful that in May I will celebrate 10 years as your rector. But my importance to this church is no greater than any other member of the body of Christ. Every last one of us, from the youngest to the oldest member, is equally valuable and important in the body of Christ.

As our Epistle today reminds us: we are all members of the one body.

“The body does not consist of one member but of many... But the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.”

Our Journey Continues reminds us we are the body of the church in this our community. As we are individually members of this one body, we know that each and every one of us has unique gifts and resources. So, our individual contributions to *Our Journey Continues* will not be an equal share, but we pray that from each of us, *it will be an equal sacrifice!*

Amen.

Stewardship Committee

Report submitted by Betty Bowersox

Last August the Stewardship Committee decided to begin a journey of year-long stewardship, complete with occasional testimonials during Sunday announcements as well as emailed ministry messages, intended to help create a link between what we believe, what we do, and what we give. Carla Kurth movingly spoke about the importance of the church family, and how these relationships lead to stewardship. We heard about gratitude and gratefulness from Stan Wallach, celebrated past achievements around Grace with Janet Mika, Andy Miller spoke about the spirituality of tithing as well as how pledging and a capital campaign fit together to address the needs of the parish, and Chris Ludbrook shared some thoughts on thanks and praise. Lastly, we heard Skip Giessing's message about volunteerism — here is an excerpt:

“Stewardship in the Episcopal Church is about being grateful, responsible stewards of the gifts we receive from God. The tradition of giving back to God and to the church comes from the biblical practice of tithing... we see stewardship as more than simply contributing money to the church; it is also about contributing time and talents, and volunteering for ministry, outreach and mission. For me, stewardship is a balance of my time, talent and treasure that I voluntarily give back to God and this church as a way of honoring what God and this church mean to me and my family....

“As a member of the finance committee, I know how important treasure is and how necessary it is for the well-being of our church. Our ability to operate and maintain our property and our ability to complete necessary mission work within our community depends on a healthy financial budget. But finance alone does not make this happen. Volunteering our time and talent are equally important ways we provide stewardship to the church. There are many service committees at Grace, and those committees are

Minutes of the 159th Annual Meeting

Sunday, January 28, 2018

Report submitted by Sue Nixon, Secretary to the Vestry

The meeting was called to order at 9:08 and opened with a prayer given by Father Todd McDowell.

Report of the Nominating Committee: Marty O’Leary presented the Report of the Nominating Committee (see pages 25 and 26 of the 2018 Annual Meeting report packet), which included a slate of three candidates for Vestry terms of three years each: John Dotson, Kelly Eschenroeder, and Mike Heyer. There was one candidate nominated to serve a three-year term as Delegate to Diocesan Convention: Pat O’Brien. There will be two unfilled positions for Delegate to Diocesan Convention. Those positions will be appointed by the Vestry. It was moved and seconded to receive the report of the nominating committee. Motion passed. At 9:12, the floor was opened to further nominations for Vestry members or Convention Delegates. The polls remain open for 30 minutes.

Junior Warden’s Report: Mike Johnson’s report can be found in the 159th Annual Meeting packet on page 3. Mike spoke to the parish about improvements made in 2017, and about future improvements, notably the installation of the spire from St. Matthew’s Church.

Senior Warden’s Report: Lyn Ballard’s report can be found on page 4 of the 159th Annual Meeting packet. Lyn highlighted improvements to the facility, programs that take place at Grace, and personnel issues.

Father Todd appointed Sue Nixon as secretary and Steve Jianakoplos as parliamentarian.

It was moved and seconded that the minutes from the 158th annual meeting be approved as written. Passed.

Rector’s Comments: Father Todd expressed his gratitude to the 2017 Vestry, especially Kurt Feigley and Marty O’Leary, who have completed their terms on the Vestry. Father Todd also extended thanks to all of those in leadership positions and to all committee members, all of whom contribute so much to the life of Grace Church.

Father Todd encouraged everyone to read the entire 2018 Annual Meeting packet, and to share it with friends. He extended thanks to Janis Greenbaum for the many hours spent putting the packet together. It was moved and seconded that all reports printed in the 2018 Annual Meeting Packet be received. Motion passed.

Endowment Fund Report: Ron Ryan reported on the Grace Endowment Fund and the Grace Legacy Fund. The report can be found on page 31 of the 2018 Annual Meeting packet. Both funds performed very well in 2017, ending with a combined balance of \$2.8 million dollars. Ron pointed out that contributions totaling \$42,000 were received in 2017. Ron also pointed out the Planned Giving and Gifts Committee report, found on page 32 of the 2018 Annual Meeting packet.

Financial Updates: Treasurer Tim Engelbrecht presented the 2018 budget, found on pages 33 and 34 of the Annual Meeting report packet. Included in the report are the actual and budget amounts for the 2017 budget, as well as the 2018 budget. Tim reported that 2017 ended with a positive balance of \$13,900. That amount has been transferred to the 2018 budget as “Other Income.” Tim extended thanks to Finance Committee members and to the staff and committees of Grace for doing an excellent job of controlling expenses. Tim invited parishioners to contact him if they have any questions regarding the budget. Tim noted that this is the fourth year of ending with a positive balance, and the fifth year of paying our full Diocesan assessment. Tim noted that loose cash plate offerings, which the Vestry has designated to go to Outreach, came in at just over \$8,000, which is over the budgeted amount of \$6,500. Utility costs have been kept down due to improvements made to the building. Principal payments of \$27,322 were made towards the \$135,000 White loan, which was taken out in September 2016. A large portion of the principal payments was from gifts designated to pay off the White Fund loan (\$21,548).

Tim reviewed the 2018 budget. He extended thanks to Debby Pidgeon for chairing the Stewardship Committee. Tim pointed out the Gifts Beyond the Budget report on page 34, which notes \$55,810 of contributions that do not pass through the ordinary budget, and support important ministries at Grace, in St. Louis, and around the world. At 9:46, it was moved and seconded that the polls close. Motion passed.

It was moved and seconded that the slate for Vestry be elected. Passed.

It was moved and seconded that the convention delegate nominee be elected. Passed.

Father Todd asked parishioners with questions about the annual report to come forward:

Q: Highlights of the Vestry meetings used to be published in the Messenger. Why are they not published anymore?

A: Father Todd will look into this, as well as the posting of the minutes in Albright Hall.

Q: Where is the new pictorial directory?

A: It is awaiting printing. One delay was waiting for the labyrinth floor to be laid, as a photo of the floor will be on the cover of the directory. There was also a good deal of editing that needed to be done.

Father Todd opened the floor to other business. There was no other business brought to the meeting by parishioners.

Father Todd's sermon will serve as the Rector's Report.

Father Todd noted that Lyn Ballard has agreed to serve another year as Senior Warden. The Vestry will elect the Junior Warden at a special Vestry meeting following the 10:00 service.

The annual meeting continues with the celebration of the Eucharist and the dedication of the labyrinth. It was moved and seconded that the annual meeting will adjourn after the dismissal of the 10:00 service. Motion passed.



CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

As we celebrate the past 160 years of our parish life, *Our Journey Continues...* gives us a unique and exciting opportunity to leave a lasting legacy. This opportunity ensures the journey of Grace Church will continue for our children and their children, for the next 160 years... and beyond!

Our Journey Continues... is a capital campaign to provide a permanence to the care of our buildings and grounds.

Funds raised through this campaign will go to the following:

- ⇒ **70% to Grace's Legacy Building and Grounds Fund**, where income generated will be used to cover our annual building expenses year after year;
- ⇒ **10% to new lighting in the church nave**, to brighten our worship space and reduce energy costs;
- ⇒ **10% to pay off the majority of our debt**, including a loan for new boilers and new roofs over the Narthex and Albright Parish Hall;
- ⇒ **10% to Grace's Outreach Fund**, as our tithe to God and our community for the blessings of this campaign.



Here's what people are saying:

Barbara Manuel:

Grace Church has been my "home" all of my life (almost 63 years). I was baptized in our former building (corner of Argonne & Taylor) in 1956, Confirmed in 1970, and married here in 1979. Some of my closest friends I met at Grace. We share activities here as well as outside of church. I believe this Capital Campaign is important for the following reasons:

- Improve the much needed lighting system in the Nave.
- Maintain our 60-year-old building, not only for our congregation but also for all the other groups that use our facilities.
- Increase our Legacy Fund for future generations to enjoy activities and worship without worry.

Joanie Van Rees:

A successful campaign will enable our members to focus on ministry and outreach. Grace members can be satisfied knowing that their contributions will be used to put the teachings of our faith into meaningful actions.

Grace Church is a second home to our family. We worship and learn there and feel confident that the building and members will be there when we need them to be.

Tim Engelbrecht:

The Capital Campaign - "Our Journey Continues" - comes at the absolute right time in Grace's history. This year we will be celebrating Grace's 160th year and I am very thankful to all the Grace members before us and what they did to get us here. But now we must step forward and put in place the means to keep Grace going for the next 160 years. Grace to me, is not only a place where we come to worship on Sundays, it is our family and where we raised our family, is where if a member is in need we all step in together to help out. It is important to me that this continues in the future so that my children and their children, etc. can experience this.

Carla Kurth:

Home is where the heart is, and Grace is my church home. I have been a member at Grace for 37 years. My children grew up in this place, this community of support. They were baptized here, were shaped by Mary Etta Heggie and the many Sunday school classes and events they attended, were guided by Philip Brunswick during their choir years (all three kids totaled 41 years of choral music!), participated in 11 mission trips, and made lifelong friends. One son was so moved by his experiences here that he went to divinity school and is now an ordained priest. And now, my granddaughter attends Grace's nursery (just like her mom did!), plays in Albright Hall, and accepts communion from Fr. Todd while surrounded by loved ones. May the circle be unbroken. I encourage you to support our capital campaign in gratitude for days past and present, and with hope for future generations who will come to call Grace home.

Mike Heyer:

I believe the capital campaign is important because it helps to ensure the parish will continue operations for future generations.

Broad support and commitment from and by parishioners is needed in order to maximize the amount raised. No amount is too small. Our goal of \$1 million gives the parish the funds needed to annually cover building and grounds maintenance expense in perpetuity as well as being able to make needed improvements in lighting, significantly payoff current outstanding debt and provide money for outreach.

Grace Church is my home. I have been a member for over 40 years. My late wife Janet was a life long member and is interred in the Columbarium. My daughters were born and raised here - baptized, confirmed and married. Both of my weddings were here. I feel it very important that future generations are able to enjoy what we are able to enjoy today.

Lyn Ballard:

It will build a financial foundation to maintain our buildings into the future. The building is 60-years-old and we need to have stability as we face future needs. These things can't be done on a crisis-only basis.

It will mean better lighting in the nave -- awfully dark in there now. It will mean more opportunity to serve persons who are vulnerable and in need in our community. It will give future leaders the ability to focus on mission and ministry rather than constantly seeking funds to repair the infrastructure.

Supporting this campaign will link us to one another and to Grace in even stronger bonds than we have now.
